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# TOWNLEY SIXTH FORM

In the Sixth Form at Townley, we seek to inspire our students to develop into confident, articulate and independent young people who are prepared for the opportunities and challenges of life. We carefully manage the transition from the highly structured nature of Year 11 in preparation for Higher Education and beyond and provide students with wide-ranging academic and pastoral support to ensure that all students can thrive academically and personally.

### Induction

We run an extensive induction programme to support and carefully manage the transition from GCSE and prepare students for the Sixth Form. We offer two induction days, the first of which is in July and focuses on the academic aspects of the Sixth Form. The second one takes place in September and focuses more on expectations of life in the Sixth Form and students as individuals, allowing them to build their confidence, meet new people and learn to work as a team. Every year, we invite WiseUp and some key students in Upper Sixth, who prepare a bespoke and enjoyable team-building day for all Lower Sixth. The transition evening invites parents/carers to the school in September. It focuses on how best they can support their children throughout the next two years and offers an opportunity for parents to meet Form Tutors and Senior Staff.

### The Sixth Form Centre

The Sixth Form Centre comprises the shared Upper and Lower Sixth space for students to mix socially throughout the day when not in study periods. Additionally, the brand-new Sixth Form Cafe offers a more relaxed university-type feel, where students can socialise in a warm and cosy setting during their free time.

Lockers are available to students and are located in their common room area.

Upper Sixth utilise the workroom within the Sixth Form area to prepare for their A-Level exams. All study areas are silent and fully serviced with Wi-Fi to enable the use of personal laptops or tablets. Additionally, students may use the library and additional study areas for tasks requiring a more collaborative approach. Many students elect to study after school and are permitted to stay in the Sixth Form Centre until 6 pm.

### Sixth Form Team

The Sixth Form team is located in the Sixth Form Centre and is on hand to support and cater to students' needs. From academic monitoring and guidance from their Learning Managers to pastoral support, we have a cohesive team who will see students through their time with us. A counseling service is also provided in the Sixth Form for students to access. Dot, our therapy dog, is in the school most days of the week and students can take her for a walk (or visit her), giving themselves some vital head space. Leaders have designed a curriculum that is academically ambitious. It prepares pupils exceptionally well for the next stage of their education or the world of work.

### Form Tutors

Students are allocated to a Tutor Group for the duration of Sixth Form. Tutors have been specially selected for their expertise in helping students with UCAS applications and writing references. Tutors are the first point of contact between school and home; they see their students every morning, provide mentoring, career and subject advice, and help students with their overall well-being. In addition to support provided by the Sixth Form Team, Sixth Formers have access to the school Student Services Team with specialised, friendly and approachable staff who are First-Aid trained and on hand to attend to students with specific medical needs.

### **Study Periods**

Study periods are an essential aspect of life in the Sixth Form. Lower Sixth initially take all their study periods in the Lower Sixth Study spaces, a supervised environment with a Study Tutor to help establish good work ethics at the start of the Sixth Form journey. As students mature and begin preparation for university, they can apply for some unsupervised study periods. As they move into the Upper Sixth, there is an increase in the number of study periods they receive.

### Reporting

Monitoring progress and feedback is vital, so reporting occurs twice a year and involves a parental evening. Individual reports, which measure the student's progress against their potential using target grades, are tracked closely by Learning Managers and Subject Departments. If at any time there are concerns, parents will be invited into the school to discuss support and next steps. Although we encourage students to develop more independence, we value our relationship with parents/carers and recognise the need for the combined support of school and home to see students through a demanding time in their lives. 6th Form at Townley is a supportive family with a pastoral team that will always

go the extra mile to help students transition into the 6th form. Students undertake a journey of self-transformation as they're encouraged to courageously



become the change they wish to see. Exuding curiosity through our rich assortment of A-Levels and Electives, students discover their passions through knowledge, both academically and beyond the classroom, gaining a holistic understanding of their interests. As Townley 6th Formers, we practise compassion and strive to selflessly empathise with and serve our wider communities. Ultimately, we become more conscious individuals who personally transform and go on to create peaceful and productive societies that raise humanity that notch higher. ### Leadership and Service

The Sixth Form students are an integral part of the Townley community and are essential role models for the rest of the school. This contact with the younger members of our school is highly valued and immensely rewarding. All members of the Sixth Form belong to one of our seven Houses, named after the Greek Goddesses. Lower Sixth students can apply for the House Captain or Vice-Captain position which carries considerable responsibility. They wear the House Tie and organise and run House activities across the school, competing for the coveted House Trophy. Their role includes running assemblies and events for Year 11 students before their Sixth Form applications.

At the end of Lower Sixth, students can apply for the prestigious positions of School Officers. These students wear the distinctive Gold Tie comprising the Head Girl, the Head Boy and the Deputies. These students take up office in Upper Sixth and commit to an evident and responsible position within the school's leadership. They meet each week with the Headteacher, act as ambassadors for internal and external events, meet VIP visitors and, among other duties, initiate the Leavers' Ball committee. At the end of the year they plan and lead the most critical event in the school calendar; Head Girl's Day.

As well as School Officers, we also appoint Senior Prefects who wear the Silver Tie. They assist the School Officers in their leadership role. Senior Prefects are assigned to staff members with specific areas of responsibility, and they help and support where necessary. Their duties often overlap with those of the Senior Officers, so they always work together.

The Townley Equity Prefects are also appointed at the end of the Lower Sixth. These students, who wear the Red Tie and work in partnership with the School Officers, lead the Equity Commission. This all-year group collaborative body aims to promote equality, diversity and inclusion across the school.

Sixth Formers are expected to reflect the highest appearance standards as a visible presence within the school. The uniform dress code must be professional and aims to replicate what is required in a business environment, contributing to the preparation for the next stage of our students' lives. We are proud of our Sixth Form; a noteworthy appearance helps identify them outside of the school environment. Please refer to the dress code information for more details.

### **Extra-curricular** Opportunities

We actively encourage Sixth Formers to get involved with all aspects of the school, and the extracurricular part of the Sixth Form is highly valued. Being a Performing Arts school, there are numerous Musical, Dance and Theatre Studies groups Sixth Formers can participate in and several sporting enrichments. Students are encouraged to set up and run these activities themselves. For example, basketball, football and netball take place after school and Media club at lunchtime.

There are numerous trips abroad, notably Berlin, New York, Japan, India and Silicon Valley, World Challenge Expeditions and Duke of Edinburgh excursions.

Students are encouraged to set up societies through a personal interest or within their departments. No matter how niche, it is up to the students to decide, and clubs have ranged from Chess to the Feminist Society. The Medical Society, run by prospective Medics, meet weekly to discuss recent articles in The British Medical Journal and new initiatives developed by the NHS and invite guest speakers to talk to students.

Students in the Sixth Form relish the opportunity to take part in and lead charity events. A significant charity day is 'Children in Need' - a hugely exciting time for Sixth Form students who have the privilege of dressing up for the rest of the school, all in aid of fundraising. Students are very inventive and choose a range of subjects to dress up as.

At Christmas, students have the opportunity to showcase the exceptional talent we have in the Sixth Form. Once again, this is devised and run by the students. The talent show is a truly inspiring event with singers, dancers, and magicians. Whatever the talent - we're sure Townley's got it!

While most students in the sixth form go to university, leaders also introduce them to other options that are available, for example apprenticeships. Students receive comprehensive support and guidance from staff when making applications.

### Scholastic Endeavour

Departments choose Subject Scholars who have excelled, are passionate and are committed. ### Head Girl's Day

Head Girl's Day is hugely memorable in the school calendar and is when we formally say farewell to our Upper Sixth Students. It is always an emotional day for all. ### 21c Sessions & Townley Symposiums


The 21c journey will provide students with an additional breadth of knowledge and holistic opportunities that further enrich their educational experience and offer a unique, bespoke experience for Townley students.

One of the areas we are passionate about is Careers Education and enhancing our students' future employability.

The Careers Team believe in building opportunities, driving social mobility and inspiring aspirations that have a lasting impact on our communities. The team work alongside the senior leadership team to embed valuable, pertinent career education that is appropriate for our students and fulfils our purpose of transforming communities through education and education through our communities.

Careers Education in Year 12 is focused on recognising and building on students' skills and preparing them for their Post18 pathways. Students are fully supported in making applications for their Post 18 transition, whether this is a university, an apprenticeship or an alternative path. The Careers Team are always on hand for advice, with bespoke Careers Guidance meetings available and a wealth of support provided through our character and wellbeing programme. It is of primary importance that students find the right pathway for them and that they are provided with the tools to make these choices.

We have also committed to Unifrog, a one-stop-shop destinations platform that has now grown to encompass all UK universities, apprenticeships and Further Education colleges, US and Canadian universities, and degrees taught in English in Europe, Asia and Australasia. Their mission is to level the playing field for young people, finding the best opportunities for them; they put having a positive social impact before anything else.

# GUIDANCE FOR BEYOND TOWNLEY

### University Guidance


We provide an extensive and comprehensive UCAS guidance programme to support students in their choice of university and course, which draws from the expert knowledge of the Careers and UCAS Team. The process begins in Year 12 with an introductory 'After A-Levels' evening and fair for students and their parents.

In June, the process begins in earnest when Year 12 will spend a day receiving talks, registering with UCAS, making a start to their applications and receiving personal statement writing support. This continues for the remainder of the year, with students allocated their referees to support them.

This focused, tailored approach sees most of our students succeed in obtaining offers from their 'first choice' universities, many of which are the top research universities in the country, otherwise known as the Russell Group.

Courses which require further tests, such as the BMAT/UCAT for Medicine and Oxbridge admissions tests, are supported through additional sessions, including courses as part of the enrichment programme, which help prepare students for these all-important hurdles. Mock interviews held by teaching staff and staff from various other schools and parent supporters provide students with a realistic view of the process.







# GUIDANCE FOR BEYOND TOWNLEY

### Medicine, Dentistry and Veterinary Science

We also provide a highly supportive programme for students wishing to follow Medicine, Dentistry or Veterinary Science. This includes a Medical elective as part of the electives programme, the Medics Society, and support from our Careers and Medics Leads.

### **Performing Arts**

We hold audition workshops led by professional actors, dancers and musicians. We run workshops led by ex-students currently attending leading Performing Arts institutions, such as The Royal Central School of Speech and Drama and Trinity Laban, to prepare them for interviews, portfolio preparation and auditions.

### **Apprenticeships**

Whilst the majority of our students will go on to university, we are equally supportive of those who decide this pathway is not for them and welcome students who wish to pursue apprenticeships where they can combine work and, in some cases, study for a qualification at the same time. Our careers department has a specialised career adviser available to all students and can assist with post-18 career opportunities.

Work Experience can take place during Year 12. Students are beginning to cement their thoughts about university and employment, and work experience can be essential to this process. Our Careers Team co-ordinated placements, with some students choosing to organise their own.

Townley's Year 13 students achieved fantastic results last year and obtained unique university places and apprenticeships. Many Townley alumni work towards or have completed apprenticeships in companies and sectors such as Deloitte, the NHS and IBM.

Oxbridge

Any students aspiring to apply at Oxford or Cambridge are supported through an extensive programme our Careers and Oxbridge leads oversee. We organise and host an annual Oxbridge Evening, and we continue to foster strong links with many colleges, including Gonville and Caius College, Cambridge and Mansfield College, Oxford. Interview workshops are arranged post-application and run by representatives from Oxford and Cambridge. Students are also allowed to arrange mock interviews with Staff and Senior Leaders to discuss topics around their area of study. This builds confidence in a tutorial setting and prepares students for an Oxbridge application. We actively promote scholarship opportunities for our students.

### Mentoring

Every student applying to Oxbridge is matched up with a subject-specific staff mentor who will mentor them in all aspects of the Oxbridge application process. This will include supporting students in preparation for the relevant admissions tests, suggesting and discussing more comprehensive reading, and preparing for interviews.

New pupils are warmly welcomed to the school. This includes boys in the sixth form.

# THE CURRICULUM

Townley offers students the opportunity to study three or four A Levels with a range of Electives to allow for an enhanced but specialised programme of study.

A Levels allow students to specialise in areas of interest, and the depth of study is critical for success at university. Townley's curriculum offers you a chance to specialise in three or four subjects while studying bespoke electives that enhance your education. This is an exciting curriculum that is tailored for Townley.

# WHAT'S ON OFFER?

Townley will offer 6 different programmes of study to students. This gives students a wide variety of options allowing them to make the correct choices depending on their interests.

Programme 1 – 3 A Levels + 1 Elective

Programme 2 – 3 A Levels + 2 Electives

Programme 3 – 3 A Levels + 1 Elective + EPQ

Programme 4 – 3 A Levels + 3 Electives

Programme 5 - 4 A Levels + 1 Elective

Programme 6 - 4 A Levels + 2 Electives

The programme chosen will depend on a future career path as well as whether they want to specialise in a few subjects or a wider variety. Further Mathematics must be chosen as a fourth A Level only.

A Levels – two-year linear qualification, 6 x 50 minute lessons a week

EPQ - Extended Project Qualification - Accredited qualification -

1 x 50-minute lesson a week

**Elective Course** – a range of one year accredited and non-accredited courses enriching your education – 1 x 50-minute lesson a week

Students in the sixth form also get to choose from a wide range of A-level subjects. In addition to these courses, all students study further 'electives', such as art appreciation and pharmaceutical science. These are expertly planned to enrich pupils' academic learning and enhance their understanding of the wider world.



# THE CURRICULUM

### Points to consider when choosing your options

There are a number of points to consider before choosing your A Level options and it is important that you take some time to reflect and decide what courses are right for you.

### What are my strengths?

When selecting your options, spend some time thinking about what subjects you are good at. It sounds simple, but it is so important! Students often find a significant jump between GCSE and A Level study, so you must reflect on your performance across the two years. What are your strengths? Do you thrive in practical subjects? Do you love or loathe coursework? Do you prefer essay-based subjects? Think about these carefully, as they will give you a good indication of your subject choices.

### What do I enjoy?

It is pivotal, and essentially the key to success, that you enjoy the subject you choose to take at A Level. Enjoyment and exam success go hand in hand, as you will find yourself more motivated to do independent study and work hard if it is a subject you actually love.

### Do some subjects mix well together?

Some courses work well together, and often, the skills learnt from one can help support and develop your understanding of another. The choice is, of course yours, but here is a list of subjects that combine well:

# BEYOND A LEVELS

It is sometimes necessary to think ahead and beyond your time at Townley. Listed below are a collection of popular university courses with required subjects deemed beneficial to have been studied at A-Level. It is important to note that requirements vary between universities, but this information will hopefully help you with your choices.

You may also have thought even further ahead to a career

### Aeronautical Engineering / Aerospace

Mathematics and a physical Science often preferred.

**Elective** Mathematics for Scientists

### **Animal Sciences**

Biology and Chemistry preferred. Relevant work experience is useful.

### Archaeology

History, Geography, English and/or a Science subject may be preferred. Two Sciences required for Archaeological Science courses.

### Anthropology

Biology and Geography preferred for some Biological Anthropological courses (Social Anthropology)

### Architecture / Architectural Engineering

Mathematics and/or Physics required or preferred for some courses. Art sometimes a requirement and a portfolio of art work often requested. **Elective** Mathematics Beyond A Level.

### Art / Design

Art A Level and portfolio of art work required by many courses. You may choose to complete an Art Foundation course prior to university. **Elective** Art Appreciation.

### Biochemistry / Biomedical Science / Genetics / Physiology

Chemistry required. Biology usually preferred, one or two Mathematics/ Science subjects required. **Elective** Medical or Mathematics for Scientists.

### Business and Management Courses / Accountancy

Mathematics is often essential or desirable. There is a wide range of courses, some show preference for Economics, Business Studies, Geography, English or a Foreign Language.

**Elective** Mathematics Beyond A Level.

### Chemistry / Chemical Engineering

Two Science subjects including Chemistry (Chemistry, Physics and Mathematics is a good combination with Further Mathematics for some courses).

**Elective** Mathematics for Scientists or Mathematics Beyond A Level.

### **Computer Science**

GCSE Mathematics at a higher level. A Level Mathematics, a Science subject or computer Science required for some courses.

**Elective** Mathematics Beyond A Level, Games Development.

path, and it is worth noting that you should not let this define all of your choices. The quality of both A-Level passes and a degree is widely regarded as a measure of a set of skills which can be applied in any number of occupations. In other words, whilst you may want to keep an eye on the future, there is much to be said for choosing subjects you are interested in and are likely to be successful.

### Dentistry

Chemistry plus Biology usually required. Another Science subject may be required or preferred. Evidence of manual dexterity must be given (eg. model-making or playing an instrument). **Elective** Medical.

### Drama / Theatre Studies

English and Theatre Studies may be required. Extensive record of involvement in theatre productions often required. Not all courses involve acting – you need to check.

### **Economics**

Mathematics and Economics may be required or preferred. Check university websites carefully for other preferred subjects.

### **Education Studies**

A Level in the main subject of choice required plus one or two other A Levels. **Elective** Public Speaking.

### Engineering

Mathematics and/or Physics usually required. Further Mathematics sometimes recommended. **Elective** Mathematics Beyond A Level.

### English

English Literature required, often two other Arts subjects. Modern Language required for joint courses.



### **Environmental Science**

One or two Science subjects are usually stipulated. Mathematics may be required. **Elective** Mathematics Beyond A Level or Mathematics for Scientists.

Film/Media:

A Level English may be stipulated for some Film courses. No specific A Levels for Media.

### Geography

Geography with two other subjects. Mathematics or Science required for BSc.

### Geology

Mathematics / Science subjects usually required. Geography may be accepted as an additional Science. Chemistry, Mathematics and Physics often preferred.

### History

History with two other Arts subjects. A Science subject or Modern Language may be considered for a third A Level.

### Law

No specific A Level subjects required but essay based can be preferred. LNAT admissions test. **Elective** Public speaking.

### **Mechanical Engineering**

Mathematics and a physical science often preferred.

### **Materials Science**

Mathematics, Physics and/or Chemistry. **Elective** Mathematics Beyond A Level.

### **Mathematics / Statistics**

Mathematics and Further Mathematics, preference given to Physics. **Elective** Mathematics Beyond A

Level.

### Medicine / Dentistry / Veterinary Science

Chemistry and Biology required. Subject requirements vary – check university websites carefully. High grades, relevant work experience essential and an interview will be required. Additional admissions tests may also be required (BMAT, UCAT). **Elective** Medical or Philosophical and Ethical Thinking or UCAT and BMAT Preparation.

### Music

A Level Music sometimes required and/or instrumental grade course required.

### **Natural Sciences**

High grades in three Sciences (check individual course requirements). Mathematics useful as a fourth A Level.

**Elective** Mathematics for Scientists or Mathematics Beyond A Level.

### **Occupational Therapy**

A social science or Science subject required for most courses.

### Pharmacy

Chemistry and one or two other Sciences usually required. **Elective** Mathematics for Scientists and Pharmaceutical Science.

### Philosophy / PPE – Philosophy, Politics and Economics

No specific subjects required. Mathematics is very useful for logic (and Economics) and an essay-based subject can give evidence of ability to expand on ideas. **Elective** Philosophical and Ethical Thinking.

Physics

Physics and Mathematics (and Chemistry sometimes preferred). Further Mathematics highly desirable for some courses. **Elective** Mathematics Beyond A Level.

### Physiotherapy

One or two Science subjects required. **Elective** Mathematics for Scientists

### **Physical Education**

PE, Sports Science required for some courses. Elective Health & Fitness.

### **Politics**

No subjects specified. Government & Politics, History or English useful. Elective An Introduction to British Politics.

### Psychology

Psychology can be beneficial. A Science subject usually required. Look carefully at individual course outlines – some more science based than others. Mathematics can also be useful.

### Sociology

No subjects specified. Sociology can be beneficial. **Elective** Philosophical and Ethical Thinking.

### Zoology / Veterinary Animal Science

Biology and Chemistry preferred. **Elective** Medical.

Sixth-form students are also keen to challenge themselves, with many choosing to do the extended project qualification.

# TRANSITION TO SIXTH FORM


### **Entry Criteria**

The overall requirement for entry to the Sixth Form is an Average Point Score of **6.00** which must include English, Mathematics (English & Maths grade 5 or above).

The overall entry requirements for students applying for <u>two</u> performing arts subjects and one additional A Level subject require an Average Point Score of **5.5** plus a successful audition

and a minimum of grade 6 in GCSE English.

The overall entry requirement for students applying for <u>three</u> performing arts subjects require an Average Point Score of **5.00** plus a successful audition and **a** minimum of grade 6 in GCSE English.



In addition, students are required to have at least grade

6 and above in the subjects they intend to study in the Sixth form, except Mathematics which require a minimum of a grade 7 at GCSE (8/9 for Further Maths). Science require grade 7. (Exception being those students applying for the Performing Arts subjects as stated above).

Conditional offers are based on predicted grades; actual places are not confirmed until GCSE results are announced. This may mean that some courses become oversubscribed and if there are more applicants than places available then we will allocate places according to the **over-subscription** criteria below:

- GCSE Point Score
- · Over subscription on a course
- Being a Performing Arts School with a second specialism in Mathematics and Computing, greater weighting may be given to these subjects
- Looked after children or other extenuating circumstances which we feel warrant special consideration.
- Siblings
- Distance
- Being a girls' school there is a limitation on the number of boys we can admit taking into consideration the facilities we can provide.

### **Applications from Townley Students**

You must have completed the initial electronic subject choices form by **4.00pm Friday 19th January 2024.** Please see the front page of the website and follow the link for admissions and internal students.

### **Applications from Newcomers**

You must have submitted your electronic application form with subject choices by **4.00pm**, **Friday 19th January 2024** - please see the front page of the website and follow the link for admissions and newcomers. Once we have received your application, we will contact your school and request your predicted grades. We may then need to invite you into school for the Assessment/Audition Day (see below).

We are sorry but in all cases late applications will not be considered.

Notification of the outcome of your application will be sent out in the week commencing **Monday 8th April 2024** if your predicted grades and assessment/audition indicate that you are likely to fulfill our admissions criteria for entry into the Sixth Form. We can only accept the predicted grades received from our initial request to your school; we cannot re-consider your application or option choice if your grades change during the academic year.

### Assessment and Audition Days

Townley students applying for Mathematics or Further Mathematics will be asked to sit a guidance assessment. This will all take place on **Monday 15th January 2024** after school, so please keep this time free.

Students who are unsuccessful in their assessment/audition will have an opportunity to select an alternative subject.

Newcomers applying applying for Mathematics or Further Maths are required to attend our assessment day on **Saturday 27th January 2024** so please keep this date free. Applicants applying for a subject within the Performing Arts cluster (Dance\*, Music and Theatre Studies) are required to audition. Auditions will be held using video footage, please refer to our subject information on our website for full details. \*Dance audition required if dance not taken at GCSE.

### Appeals

If an application is refused there is a statutory right of appeal to the Independent Schools Appeal Panel.



# SUBJECT CRITERIA

The majority of subjects require a grade 6 or above for acceptance onto the course. If you wish to study Mathematics you must achieve a grade 7 at GCSE (8 for Further Mathematics), If you wish to study a Science a grade 7 is needed in Biology, Chemistry, Physics.


